EVENING GARDEN VISITS 2024

Carol Treharne has now retired from the Committee, and we are delighted that Lynda Eaton will be organising our evening visits this year She has arranged three lovely visits, as detailed below and, as usual, all visits are on Tuesday evenings, to start at 6.00pm. Sunflower signs will be displayed where appropriate.

Tuesday 21st May 2024

East Clayton Farm, Storrington Road, Washington, RH20 4AG

A little different from our usual garden visits, East Clayton is a 120 acre farm which, during the day, offers young people a safe space where they can learn new life skills in both horticulture and working with small animals. The site was previously a derelict farm owned by the National Trust, and is now leased to the Lonica Trust. Katy will show us the raised beds and tell us about their 'pot to plate' initiative. There is a sensory garden and also a separate pond which has been recently created. There is also a 'therapeutic' smallholding with chickens, turkeys, sheep, pigs, donkeys and goats.

Directions: Take the A24 to Worthing. Turn right at the Storrington roundabout (3rd exit), and soon after the roundabout turn right at the sign post for NT Warren Hill. The car park is up the lane on the left hand side.

The donation is £8, which goes to the Lonica Trust, and includes refreshments.

Tuesday 18th June 2024

Colwood House, Cuckfield Lane, Warninglid, RH17 5SP. Mrs Rosy Brenan

12 acres of garden with mature and specimen trees and lawns. There is a long herbaceous border which overlooks the flower rimmed croquet lawn, plus a cut turf labyrinth and forsythia tunnel. The garden includes water features, statues and gazebos. There is a giant chessboard and a lake with an island and temple.

Directions: From Horsham take the Brighton Road (A281). After 3 miles turn left onto Sandygate Lane at Lower Beeding (B2115), bear slight left towards Handcross. After 1 mile turn right onto Warninglid Lane (B2115) and follow the road for 2 miles, past the Half Moon pub, and Colwood House is on the right.

The donation is £10 for the NGS and includes refreshments.

Tuesday 23rd July 2024

Mill Hall Farm, Whitemans Green, Cuckfield (Post code not included as this will take you to the Rugby Club!) Kate & Jonathan Berry

A 2.5 acre 10 year old garden with long maturing view sloping down to a pond and beyond. Long borders with herbaceous planting and ornamental trees. The garden contains a Victorian underground water system, guarded by a nymph, which is used to water the garden. There is a bumpy lawn and no hard paths (no wheelchair access to WC).

Go through Warninglid on the B2115 (as above). Follow the road to the end and then turn right at the T Junction onto the B2114 towards Cuckfield. Go past Cuckfield Golf Club and Garden Centre on the left. After the Cuckfield road sign and Webster Cottages on the right, turn left opposite the playing field and then left into the drive. Parking is on the right at the end.

The donation is £10 for the NGS and includes refreshments.

There was a raffle, a home grown plant and produce stall, and a huge selection of cakes to add to the interest of the main event the floral displays, cookery and handicraft.


At the end of the day judges had judged, points awarded and cups presented. We had a most successful day!

RHS GARDEN ENTRY DISCOUNT CARD

The Society is affiliated to the RHS, and as part of this affiliation we have received an RHS Garden Entry Discount Card. This card offers two adults a 50% discount off entry to any RHS Garden (Bridgewater, Harlow Carr, Hyde Hall, Rosemoor and Wisley), with the exception of Flower Shows and Glow illumination events. Seed Viability—waste not, want not

Just like packaged fruit and veg, do not assume that seeds past their "use by" date are ready for the bin. The viability will decrease over time, and different seeds have different storage times, but it's a shame (and can be expensive) to bin them without seeing if they are still viable. Below is a simple test to see if they are still worth using:

- 1. Lay a piece of damp kitchen towel on a place, then sprinkle a sample of your old seed in individual rows to aid identification.
- 2. Cover the plate with cling film and keep it in a warm place indoors. Make sure the towel stays damp and check regularly for signs of germination (noting the date when shoots appear).
- Germination times vary between veg, but after 2 weeks most viable seeds should have sprouted. Count how many have germinated – if it's about half, then you've got 50 per cent viability. The lower the percentage the more seed you'll need to sow to get a decent crop.



Here is a general guide to some of the more popular seeds, and how long after their "use by" date they are likely to be viable for (although different sources will vary slightly):

Vegetables	Years	Flowers	Years
Beans & Peas	2-3 years	Anthemis	2-3 years
Beetroot	3-5 years	Antirrhinum	3-4 years
Brassicas	3-5 years	Cosmos	3-4 years
Carrot	3-4 years	Dianthus	2-3 years
Celery	2-3 years	Gaillardia	3-4 years
Chard	3-5 years	Impatiens	2-3 years
Cucumber	5-10 years	Lavender	4-5 years
Lettuce	2-3 years	Marigold	5-6 years
Radish	3-5 years	Petunia	3-4 years
Squash	2-5 years	Sunflower	5-7 years
Tomato	5-10 years	Zinnia	6 years
