EVENING GARDEN VISITS 2023

Our three evening garden visits for this year are detailed below. As usual, all visits are on Tuesday evenings, to start at 6.00pm, and sunflower signs will be displayed where appropriate.

Tuesday 23rd May 2023

33 THE PLANTATION, WORTHING, WEST SUSSEX BN13 2AE. Mrs Judy Gordon

This is a medium sized town garden with something of interest all year round. The garden has several mature trees creating a feeling of seclusion. The informal beds contain a mixture of shrubs, perennials, cottage garden plants and spring bulbs. There are little hidden areas to enjoy, a small fish pond and other water features. There is also a pretty log cabin overlooking the garden.

Directions: Take the A24 to Worthing which meets the A27 at the Offington Roundabout. Turn into Offington Lane and then first right into The Plantation.

The donation is \pounds 8.50 which includes the refreshments and goes to the NGS. Judy will accompany us in a tour of the garden.

Tuesday 13th June 2023

IRONWOOD HOUSE, CLAPGATE LANE, SLINFOLD, HORSHAM, RH13 OQU. Mrs Louise Sims

One acre country garden around former rectory which has been designed, built, planted, and maintained by the present owners over the past thirty years. Formal near the house, becoming less manicured further away. There is a naturalistic pond with boathouse, a formal pool and, in the autumn, a large area devoted to late summer flowering plants and grasses – a haven for many pollinating insects. There are some interesting trees, shrubs, and climbers and many pots with tender perennials. There are also some unusual plants for sale.

Directions: Take the road to Newbridge Nursery, then the A264 towards Billingshurst. Turn right at the Toyota Garage for Slinfold. Follow the road to the Village and turn right before the Primary School, into Clapgate Lane. Ironwood House is first on the left just past the Church.

There is a donation of £8 going to St Catherine's Hospice, Crawley and Louise will take us on a tour of the garden. Hopefully, we will have refreshments outside.

Tuesday 11th July 2023 (subject to change—please check on our website nearer the time) 70 SMITHBARN, HORSHAM, WEST SUSSEX, RH13 6DU. Mrs Sue Brundish

Looking to view a perfect, tidy garden? What you will see is a working garden that offers colour at all times of the year, developed over 20 years by self-confessed plantaholic and past Chair of Horsham in Bloom! Sue's endeavours skilfully cloak the labours of concrete junkie husband Derek who, as a retired scientist, endlessly experiments with structures and edibles!

Directions: From the Comptons Lane roundabout, take the Comptons Lane exit then first left into Millais and follow the road, keeping right into Smithbarn. Sue's house is just along on the left hand side.

The donation is £5 which includes refreshments and Sue will take us on a tour of the garden.

LOCAL SUMMER OUTING

The cost of hiring a coach is still extremely high, and we have again decided not to run an outing until this becomes more affordable for all. We will instead aim to organise a local trip during the summer where members can make their own way there.

Following our interesting talk by Colin McFarlin, a volunteer with WSCC Waste & Recycling, it has been suggested we visit the flagship waste facility at Brookhurst Wood, just outside of Horsham.

This is a chance to see what happens to our household waste once it leaves our homes. The cutting edge Mechanical and Biological Treatment plant has the capacity to process over 310,000 tonnes of waste per year and is capable of shredding, sorting and treating waste, as well as exporting power to the national grid.

Group numbers are restricted, and once we have confirmation of a date we will e-mail you to book your place to this fascinating facility.

Our blue lidded bins and other materials for recycling are taken to Ford MRF (Materials Recycling Facility) who also allow group visits, however this site is slightly more inaccessible to visitors who are less mobile. They do, however, provide a short presentation in their Education Centre (wheelchair accessible) and provide an opportunity to see the MRFs state-of-the-art technology from viewing platforms (no wheelchair access). Those reliant on a walking stick or less mobile can watch live CCTV footage from the Education Centre. Visits last for approx. 2 hours.

If the visit to Brookhurst Wood proves popular, we can then organise a visit to Ford in the future.

RHS GARDEN ENTRY DISCOUNT CARD

The Society is affiliated to the RHS, and as part of this affiliation we have received an RHS Garden Entry Discount Card. This card offers two adults a 50% discount off entry to any RHS Garden (Bridgewater, Harlow Carr, Hyde Hall, Rosemoor and Wisley), with the exception of Flower Shows and Glow illumination events. Fill your home with flowers

There is nothing more rewarding that filling your home with freshly picked flowers from your garden or allotment. There was an interesting article in a recent Gardeners' World magazine with tips for preparing and prolonging your displays that we thought would be worth sharing with you.



Pick stems when it's cool, using sharp, clean secateurs to prevent damage to the stems and to avoid the build-up of bacteria, which will shorten their vase life.

To maximise the longevity, cut the flowers when the buds are starting to unfurl – pick earlier and they may not open at all, pick later and they just won't last. There are exceptions; for instance dahlias should be picked when three-quarters open.

Cut just above a leaf joint, as this is where new growth will form for later picking. Cut the stem at an angle to maximise the exposed cut surface area and therefore increase water uptake.

Get your stems into a bucket or container of water as quickly as possible.

Before arranging, re-cut the stems and remove any leaves that will sit below the water, as these will rot. Make a 2.5cm cut through the base of woody stems to increase water absorption.

Refresh the water every day to prevent the build-up of bacteria.

Position the foliage first and insert the stems so that it criss-crosses, providing a framework in which the rest of the material can be placed. If you want to go for a more naturalistic feel, avoid placing flowers symmetrically.

You don't need to stick to vases – you can re-purpose all manner of vessels such as buckets, tin cans or glass jam jars (we have a new category for just such a display in our Spring Show Schedule!). For larger vessels you may need chicken wire or sticky floral tape to hold the material in place.

Finally, keep the arrangement away from fruit, which gives off a hormone that will hasten the demise of your blooms!

Flowers perfect for picking include Sunflowers, Scabiosa, Nasturtium, Cosmos, Rudbeckia, Dahlia, Antirrhinum, Xerochrysum (strawflowers) and Ammi majus with its frothy foliage and small delicate white flowers.
